10.00 – 11.00 Lecture by Jostein Gaarder: “Human Rights and Human Obligations. What can be done to address climate change?”. Jostein Gaarder is an author from Norway with high international esteem. With his novel “Sophie’s World” he won the world’s best fiction title in 1995, 33 million sold copies and translated into 55 languages. Gaarder has established a humanitarian foundation, The *Sophie Prize*. The prize is an international award for environment and sustainable development.

Film: “Frozen heart”. The film portrays Roald Amundsen, the first to conquer the South Pole (1911), and probably the first to plant a flag at the North Pole (1926).
